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## ALBANY INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT PRESENTS Cloudlands

Albany, NY (January 13, 2017) - - - The Albany International Airport Art & Culture Program will present Cloudlands, an exhibition in which seven artists present structures that are not quite habitable, small worlds made up of architectural, natural and mechanical fragments, and images suggestive of things we might recognize, but ultimately evade our grasp. The exhibition will run from January 28 through July 31, 2017. A public reception will be held on February 17, from 5:30-7:30 p.m.

Cloudlands is a geography whose features are elusive and ethereal; a dream-like state in which sense and nonsense poetically blend. Naoe Suzuki's intricate works on paper teem with life – their tangled masses of roots, seed pods, body organs and waterways describing new organic forms.

Edward Mayer's complex transfer drawings have similar qualities – fragments of things we recognize, like a cathedral, or a shoe, or a cluster of grapes, are treated as visual texture and linked by their formal qualities rather than common

associations. Fans of Mayer's well-known sculpture installations may see parallels in the way that he approaches this two-dimensional body of work

Julie Evans' jewel-like paintings evoke fantastical landscapes, in which contemporary painting sensibilities mingle with the intricacies of Indian miniaturist traditions.

Susan Meyer presents sculptures that resemble curious, self-sustaining habitats that are at once built and alive. Within them, tiny figures appear, mingling by glowing pools or perched on the edges of smooth, translucent cliffs.

Emerging from **Dana Filibert's** sensuously billowing sculptures are mythical creatures that sprout wings and bubble with found and invented forms.

Animals as well as human figures populate **Joshua Field's** work, appearing as actors in some non-linear narrative, or deeply personal allegory.


